NEW DECCA RECORD of folk songs and spirituals by the Columbus Boychoir may be made about May 1st, according to word from Leonard Joy, Decca executive who has handled previous Boychoir recordings. No details have been released yet but Mr. Bryant has been asked to prepare a program of possible selections to be included in the proposed album if tentative plans become definite. If produced, the new label will be the third Decca release currently available, the others being "Festival of Song," recorded about six years ago, and "Joy to the World," a Christmas album made in 1959.

BOYCHOIR CAMP will be in session again this summer at Shawnee-on-Delaware, Pa., for the fourth time at its site on Fred Waring property near his famous Shawnee Inn. Opening date is Sunday, June 25th and closing, Sunday, August 6th, a six-week period. Program and arrangements will be the same as last year.
