MR. DONALD BRYANT, Musical Director of the Columbus Boychoir School, has been a staff member of the school since 1948. Mr. Bryant was born in Fredericktown, Ohio. He is now living at 70 Galbreath Drive East, Princeton, New Jersey. Mrs. Bryant is the sixth grade teacher at the school. Travis, 18, and Stephen, 12, are his sons. Travis attends the Princeton High School and was a former member of the choir. Stephen is now touring with the choir. Mr. Bryant's mother, now in Columbus, O., was interested in music and played the piano. This caused him to become interested in music. His father owned a hardware store in Chesterville, O. His sister, Mrs. Brueck, is married to a Lutheran minister and lives in Portland, Oregon. Graduating from Chesterville High School, he went on to Capital University in Columbus, O. He received his degree in music education and composition. Following Capital University he spent four years in the US Army. After that he went to Juilliard School of Music in New York City.
