THURSDAY, November 15th we took a guided tour of the United States Air Force Academy. It is the toughest military academy to get into in the United States. The requirements to get in are: age 17-22, a male citizen of the United States, good moral character, not married, good physical condition, at least 5'6" tall and no more than 6'6", and be in the top third of your high school class.

The physical education program at the Academy is wonderful. The gym is in the shape of a "U". It has four basketball courts, three swimming pools, and a special gym for gymnastics. All the cadets are required to play varsity or intramural sports. We watched some of the classes the cadets were taking. We saw a class in boxing, basketball, gymnastics and a class on posture and standing erect. We were told to watch closely.

The cadet dorms are four stories high and two cadets share a room. There are twenty-four hundred cadets. They are divided into twenty-four squadrons. We stopped at Arnold Hall and saw the band rehearsing. The hall was named after the first five star general. There is a living room where cadets may entertain guests. A cadet is allowed to watch TV on his own free time. They also have a large ballroom where they hold dances.

There are only seven hundred freshman selected each year. Freshman have to report for training about July first and are not allowed to go home until the next June. After the freshman year, the cadets are allowed to go home. A freshman is given ten dollars a month, a sophomore is given fifteen, a junior is given twenty-five dollars, and a senior receives thirty-five dollars per month. Only seniors are permitted to have cars.

We ate lunch at the Academy Cafeteria. We were all very impressed with the tour.
